on it are coming undone, it has greatly faded, or it has some mysterious hole in it that you do not think was there before? I'm sure that the answer for most, if not all of us, is "yes, I have." Clothes, although we may or may not realize it, are actually very fragile. Now you're probably laughing and saying something along the lines of, "Fragile? You can not be serious. It is not like if you drop your shirt, it is going to break into a bajillion pieces."

Have you ever taken your favorite shirt And you're right about the breaking out of the closet and see that the seams into a bajillion pieces; however, clothes are fragile in the fact that they can be ripped, the color can easily fade, and the seams can easily come undone and break. So this leads to the question, how can one make their clothes last longer?

> One way that you can make your clothes last longer is by upcycling it. What is upcycling? Upcycling clothing is to take old, worn out or damaged clothing and transform it into

something new. You can take a couple of pairs of old jeans and turn them into a denim jacket, or you could take an old maxi skirt, cut off the ripped seam, bring it up, create pant legs, and turn it into a romper/jumpsuit. There are so many things that you can do to upcycle your clothing. Get creative and have fun with it!

Another way that you can make your clothes last longer is by purchasing higher quality clothing. Many people argue against buying higher quality clothing because it is more expensive, and they would be right. At least when just thinking about the initial cost.





Higher quality clothing will be less likely to fade, form holes, and have ripped seems which make them last longer. By purchasing higher quality clothing, a shirt can last you one, two, three, etc. years whereas buying a shirt of lesser quality may possibly last you less than a year. Is the initial cost more expensive? Yes; however, in the long term, you are actually saving money because you are not having to replace worn out or damaged clothing as often. There is also the option to purchase higher quality second hand such as at a thrift store. You can still have the same quality, but since you are buying it secondhand, it will be at a lesser cost.



The last way (that we are going to discuss here) to make your clothes last longer is to actually hand wash your clothes. Now most of you are going to tell me to wait or stop because we are not in the eighteenth century or something along those lines. You are right. We are not in the eighteenth century; however, that does not mean that hand washing your clothes will not make them last longer because, the fact is, they will. Using a washing machine to wash your clothes for you, while convenient, is super hard on your clothes. Much of the faded color, ripped seems, and unexplained holes in your clothing is actually from your washing machine. Hand washing is much more gentle on your clothes and the fabric because you do not have a machine tossing and turning your clothes as hard as it possibly can. You can gently clean the clothes with your hands which will keep them looking nice, but also, many times, hand washing your clothes will actually get them cleaner than they would if you were just to stick them into the washing machine. You can also control the exact water temperature and the soap you use for handwashing is usually less harsh than washing

machine detergent which will also help prevent your clothes from becoming faded.

There are three very good and easy ways to make your clothes last longer: upcycle them, buy higher quality, and hand wash them instead of putting them into your washing machine. Upcycling clothes can honestly give a single piece (or multiple pieces) of clothing multiple lives in multiple forms. Buying higher quality clothes, although it can be more expensive in the short term, will actually help you save money in the long term because you will not be replacing clothes as frequently because they are not getting worn and damaged as quickly. Handwashing is much gentler on clothes than washing them in the washing machine is, and because of that, you will be much less likely to have your clothes fade, the seems tear, or have mysterious holes show up out of nowhere. If you're trying to figure out how to make your clothes last longer, try these three simple steps. I think you will find that they work, and (especially with upcycling) can be a lot of fun.

If you are Wintonian (Winchester, UK local), you'll know that Parchment Street is the place to shop. From timeless home decor in Pavia-Lee, to second-hand gifts in Oxfam Books & Music, and delicious delights in Piecaramba!, Parchment Street has it all. It's no surprise then that this terraced street is home to one of Winchester's gems of retail - Earthian.

Earthian is a Zero Waste shop, which means it focuses on providing a sustainable and plastic-free alternative to traditional supermarkets. Not

only does Earthian follow the three R's we all know and love -Reduce, Reuse, Recycle - but it adds two more to the equation for a sustainable lifestyle. Refuse; stop bringing plastic or wasteful products and packaging into your life, and rot; everything you have should last as long as it



can before being returned to the earth to compost.

we can't let it become a fleeting goal. It's about everyone's future and it will take long-term changes to turn the tide. Aiming at being zero waste is a good place to start, if it helps you to check your habits and find ways to reduce your impact. At Earthian, it's our whole reason for existing and I want to do more than help others to reduce their waste. I'm also working on making the business zero waste to landfill, we're about 95% there and when we achieve that last bit, I'll be really happy to see the shop truly embody its values. As an exercise it has been so valuable in pushing us to make changes to our supply chain, to how we deal with stock, deliveries, wastage and all sorts of other things that we often don't think about.

I suppose the ethos behind Earthian is 'the power of the swap'. What are the most basic swaps someone can make in their life to start living more sustainably?

KC: Using what you have to refill time and time again is honestly the first thing I would suggest. This is the simplest way to start and the cheapest! Say your shampoo and conditioner bottles are now empty, don't throw them in the recycling bin, bring them to us and we can fill them up for a couple of pounds! You then have two bottles saved from the ocean and your shower routine is the same as before. Once you've got the hang of refilling there are other great

waste reducing swaps out there to try, it really depends on your routine and where you find most waste in your life.

The majority of young people today are actively trying to make more sustainable changes. However, these changes sometimes get a bad rap for being inaccessible due to cost barriers. How does Earthian maintain being a valid option for students or those on lower budgets?

KC: I'm trying hard to challenge the idea that sustainable living has to be expensive and exclusive. I want this way of living to be for everyone so wherever possible we'll price match to supermarkets, often we're cheaper than they are! Also, you can buy as much or as little as you need, so if you only need pasta for dinner tonight you can come and grab just that much, saving money and waste. I don't want living this way to be a sacrifice for anyone, but we also need to consider who is being sacrificed for the low costs in the supermarkets. We're fighting for fair wages, fair pay throughout the supply chain and it can be hard to balance that with affordability sometimes but talking to customers in the shop I hear that their budget hasn't needed to change to shop with us and that is really encouraging.

Now, Earthian is not just a one-stop shop for refills and low-plastic goodies. You also have some amazing recycling schemes. KC: Yes! We are a collection point for 5 different recycling schemes, all of them raise money for charity. We've got milk bottle tops and bread bags raising money for Kicks Count Charity, a bra bank that goes to Against Breast Cancer Research, bike inner tubes for Cycle of Good and printer cartridges for Winchester Youth Counselling. For Winchester Fashion Week we're supporting the Winchester Beacon as a collection point for the Drop Your Drawers campaign. They're asking for

donations of new, unused underwear for residents at the shelter who may only have the clothing they're wearing when they arrive. You can bring donations to the shop and we'll sort it, pack it and pass it on.

Katie, being the founder of Earthian, I am sure you must try to be as unbiased as possible in terms of stocking the shop. But I have to ask - what is your favourite swap item that you sell in Earthian?

KC: Absolutely, I try to get a wide range of products to suit everyone, but I also use most of it myself at home too! Picking a favourite is



really hard, but the thing I love most that I have at the shop is my Mooncup. It's a weird one to pick but for me it's been amazing. I've had it for 3 and a half years; in that time, I've saved around 630 sanitary products from being needed but it's also saved me money too.

Finally, you have three words to describe Earthian to our readers. Go!

KC: Sustainable. Affordable. Independent.

According to the United Nations, up to 8% of global carbon emissions are caused by the fashion industry, and approximately one rubbish truck full of clothing is either taken to the landfill or burnt every second. So, what can be done to combat the fashion industry's effect on our world? How can you shop for fashion in a more sustainable manner? The answer - cyclical shopping. If you own an item of clothing that you don't need anymore, don't throw it away - donate it or sell it on. You don't have to always buy new clothes in order to buy clothes that are new to you. This idea of cyclical shopping is incredibly popular online but that doesn't mean it's reserved for just the online world. Nor is it just reserved for charity shops or black bags full of clothes.
